I am especially grateful to Archbishop Wenski who celebrated the closing liturgy and blessed the incoming officers at their installation — myself as President, President-Elect Maribeth Stewart and Secretary Jean Kelly.

Good news travels fast and we have had a member call the office saying they were so sorry to miss this con-

vention and asking when they could sign up for 2016! We know the place and date -- Sept. 7-10, 2016 in Indianapolis, IN. Now the work begins to plan another exciting convention so start planning to join your sisters in Council for this occasion. I am grateful for this opportunity to serve as your President and pray to God for his guidance as NCCW continues to be the voice of and for Catholic women. May we grow in His love and prosper the work of our hands in His name.

It was a privilege to attend a NCCW Convention as President of an affiliation this September in Orlando FL, with almost 700 other women from around the nation. My first feeling was no less than joyful at a gathering of sisters celebrating the Eucharist, sharing experiences of their affiliations, and joining in break-out sessions which informed and educated us about current issues.

The Service Commission training session was a highlight for me in that it awakened in me a new perception of domestic violence. Through dramatic presentations, I gained knowledge in identifying victims and understanding of tools to use to counsel victims.

Perhaps even more pertinent to me

was the extraordinary presentation by author Brandon Vogt who shared five powerful strategies to share your faith. The emphasis on sharing the Gospel through social media, along with his vivid examples, challenges me to share this with our council that they may learn to embrace New Media as an essential tool in evangelizing. Evangelizing via the media connects us with the young people and the unchurched. Blogging, u-tube, twitter, Facebook, smart phones and other mobile devices are the popular communications that link all people together. Evangelizing through the use of digital content is an effective way to deliver the faith to many at a time when the world needs the hope of Christ.

I loved every minute I spent in the Exhibit room relishing the resources and fresh ideas. Here is one to share — ASAP, not “as soon as possible, but “Always Say A Prayer”. A fresh approach, right?

By the closing liturgy I felt empowered through witnessing the faith of the women present, their joy in serving the poor and marginalized and their dedication to share the hope Jesus gives to all people.

My hope is that I can be a better sower of hope to the ladies in my affiliation and those I meet in my daily life.

I am grateful for the opportunity to have attended and look forward to experiencing many more in the future.

East Central Deanery News

East Central Deanery is in the process of re-forming. We now have members from eight parishes and are reaching out to others in the deanery with the hopes that they will join us soon. We have recently approved By-Laws and will hold an election at our spring meeting on May 21, 2016.

On the first Saturday in Lent, February 13 at 10:00 am, we will host a day of reflection titled *God's Mercy, Love that Restores* at Our Lady of the Rosary parish in Panama City. Deacon Andy and wife Kate Grosmaire will tell of their daughter's death at the hands of her boyfriend and how the two families working together found forgiveness, reconciliation, and restorative justice for the young man. All are invited: men and women, Catholic or non-Catholic, those who need to forgive and those who need forgiveness.

Service Commission

Seminarian Jack Campbell wrote an article on the “Power of Service” for our parish bulletin. His insight and perception caught my attention. “Power is an awesome thing: affirms your accomplishments, your abilities, your worth—it gets you ‘things.’ Power is a natural to strive for, enjoy and celebrate. Even though it seems to be a ‘natural-order’ of things, it is often the opposite of what Jesus teaches us: to forego selfish striving for importance, achievement and wealth: instead love your enemies...turn your cheek...give to the poor...take up your cross,” were among his thoughts.

At our recent NW Deanery General meeting, I listened to the descriptions of services accomplished by the affiliation council members: food and clothing drives, burse club drives, prayer services for our friends, relatives and our extended family going through difficult times, keeping God’s house clean, taking communion to the sick (at home, in the hospital or in nursing homes), community and parish events to raise funds to help those less fortunate, or funds for donations to local non-profit agencies, donating clothing, toiletries, and medicines to others in need. The list continues....

In reflection, Service is not just going to church and it is not reciprocal. Service is what God calls us to in an act of giving of ourselves for the gain of others. Seminarian Jack Campbell feels “service has some degree of aversion, some degree of discomfort.” However, the gift we receive, once we pass the obstacle of battling our inconveniences and discomfort, is finding a greater joy in giving rather than receiving, this is the true gift of service.

I think of the presidents and staff of all the catholic women across our diocese, women who give of themselves in their everyday lives for the gain of others, all through the grace of God. I am humbly grateful to be part of such a powerful group. Still, ‘seek ye first His kingdom, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.’ Thank you Seminarian Jack Campbell for your insight in “The Power of Service” article.
